Singapore After-Competition Report - 29.08/01.09 2012

Singapore, 05 SEPTEMBER 2012 – The World Youth Climbing Championship 2012 was dominated by the contingent from Russia, with them sweeping 13 out of the top 18 places in all categories for the speed climbing.

Leading the pack was Nikita Suyushkin of Russia, with a climb of 6.75 seconds. He beat compatriot Dimitrii Timofeev, who clocked 7.05 seconds, in the Male Junior Category.

The Female Junior Category saw the French contingent show their mettle, with Anouck Jaubert clocking 9.05 seconds. Her compatriot Esther Bruckner completed her climb in 9.49 seconds.

In the Lead Championships, Japan's Momoka Oda in the Female Junior category led the field in all her attempts. She completed the course on all days, leaving her nearest opponent, Austria's Magdalena Rock, 0.72 points behind.

The Male Junior category in the Lead Championships was again dominated by Russia. Dmitry Fakiryarov took the honours with a score of 43+, to Slovenia's Domen Skofic's 39+.

Held on the sandy Siloso Beach on Singapore's Sentosa island, the championship attracted 540 competitors from 46 different countries. It is the largest climbing wall ever in Singapore, measuring 24m by 16m.





This year's World Youth Championship is especially significant as it is set against the backdrop of an upcoming bid in 2013 for Sport Climbing to be included in the Olympic Games in 2020.

Eight new sports are currently vying to become part of the Olympic Games and three are expected to be selected for inclusion. The bid for Sport Climbing will be supported by the World Youth Championship 2012 in Singapore. Additionally, Sport Climbing is also bidding to be one of the medal sports for the SEA Games in 2015.

Of the 540 participants taking part in the Championship, 237 are females and 303, males. The largest contingent of 52 participants are from Russia, followed by 47 from the United States, 38 from Singapore, 29 from South Africa and 26 each from Canada, Indonesia and South Korea.
